Book Review

Everything to Lose by Andrew Gross

Andrew Gross has co-authored a few novels with the world's number 1 seller of thrillers, James Patterson. However, *Everything to Lose* is a solo effort and a very commendable effort at that. *Everything to Lose* works on the premise that there is a dark edge to all of us but it is rarely revealed unless by force of circumstance.

Enter our protagonist Hilary Cantor. She has a son with Asperger Syndrome who needs to attend a special school that costs a bundle of money (remember this is America). She has an exhusband who is bankrupt, and, to top it all off, she has just been retrenched from her well-paid job. Hilary's parents can't help out because they have financial problems of their own.

What does she do to make ends meet?

Well, Hilary is the first to arrive at a fatal auto accident. The driver is alone in the smashed up car and very dead. There is a bundle of money right next to him. Everything Hilary has been taught, in terms of morality and ethics, tells her to leave the money where it is but blood is thicker than morals, isn't it?

The special school for her only child, Brandon, costs a heap of money, but there have been significant and very measurable improvements in his quality of life. The education he receives at this special school works. Hilary fights tooth and nail with her conscience, but in the end she just can't pull Brandon out of the costly school.

The "dark side" of Hilary becomes manifest and she takes the money. But, as in life, nothing is ever as simple as it seems. Just take the satchel full of one hundred dollar notes and run, and everything will be OK. Hilary soon finds out, much to her chagrin, that the solutions to life's big problems are never that easy.

This thriller is a medieval morality play set in a contemporary context. However, *Everything to Lose* is never staid or boring – its frenetic pace leaves the reader wanting more. It is an action-packed entertaining read that shows that in the modern world of relationship problems and financial stress, even the best of us can falter and lose our way.

Reason for Absence Notes

It is a legal requirement that if a child is absent for any reason then it must be explained in a signed note by the parent/caregiver.

The Home School Liaison Officer checks for notes to match absences and if absences are not accompanied by a note parents/caregivers may need to explain.

Certain procedures must be carried out when children are absent from school for **any** period of time including full day absence and partial absence (late arrival to school/early departure due to appointments or sickness etc.)

The school has provided a 'REASON FOR ABSENCE' note to assist you to notify the school when your child is absent or late. More notes are available from the Front Office if required.
